Message from the Principal

Dear Parents,

I am sure you share my sadness regarding the recent school shooting in Florida. As a principal, it is my greatest job to keep our students safe and I take that responsibility very seriously. We work hard to maintain a safe and caring school through clear behavior expectations, positive behavior and interventions and supports and crisis planning and preparedness. It is crucial that we create a caring school community in which adults and students respect and trust each other and all students feel connected, understand expectations, and receive the behavioral and mental health support they need.

Every year our staff participates in a "Standard Response Protocol" training. During this training we learn about the best ways to react to emergency situations. We work hard to prepare our students for any emergency that may occur. We conduct 2 safety weeks a year where students practice what to do in different situations. Our most recent safety week was the week of Valentines Day and the Florida shooting. We were scheduled to practice our lock down drill the day after Valentines Day but in light of the shooting decided it would be better to wait a couple of weeks. I am always impressed with how well our students do and how seriously they take all of these drills.

We keep our doors locked at all times and visitors must be buzzed in at the front to be let in. We are so grateful to have so many loyal volunteers and our secretaries quickly learn who the parents are and who the visitors are! We also have an armed school marshall who visits our building many times a day. There are cameras throughout the school that we can monitor in the front office. We ask that you as parents help us. If you see anything suspicious in the neighborhood or around the school, please let us know.

If your child asks you questions it is important to talk with them and validate their feelings. Let their questions guide what and how much information to provide, be open to opportunities to talk when they are ready, be honest about your own feelings related to violence, and emphasize the positive things that child/family/school can do to stay safe. Be patient. Children and youth do not always talk about their feelings readily. Watch for clues that they may want to talk, such as hovering around while you do the dishes or yard work. Some children prefer writing, playing music, or doing an art project as an outlet. Young children may need concrete activities (such as drawing, looking at picture books, or imaginative play) to help them identify and express their feelings.

Keeping my students safe is something I lose sleep over at night, but I know that together we can create the safest school possible for our students. If you have any ideas or suggestions please let me know!!

Letter from Feeder Area Principals regarding testing:

Greetings to our Sabercat K12 Community,

We hope that this year is off to a prosperous start and your children are loving being a part of the K12 Sabercat family. We love our feeder and take great pride in the growth, accomplishments, and talents of our amazing students. We are reaching out to you today regarding an important matter. Standardized testing season is approaching. This brings up many emotions for all of our stakeholders. Many students feel anxious about taking a formal assessment, but we also know our parents often feel strongly about this topic as well. Currently, school leadership is facing two competing agendas. State law mandates that schools administer standardized assessments to all students. In a seemingly competing agenda, law also allows parents to opt out of assessments. Regardless of the number of students that take the assessment, a school is evaluated based on student performance. When all students do not take the assessment, the data is a not an accurate reflection of our schools' performance.

Our feeder acknowledges that we currently live in a world where our students are under assessment overload. The Sabercat community believes in offering your children amazing learning opportunities and a variety of ways in order for them to demonstrate growth and understanding. We believe in our feeder philosophy: we must prepare our students for the world as it exists right now and we must prepare our students for the world that does not exist. We take great pride that our learning models are producing creative problem solvers, empathetic human beings, and students who will be competitive on the world stage, but it is also imperative that our students are able to meet the measures that they are held accountable for right now. These are also the measures to which we hold ourselves accountable. We want all of our Sabercats to be college ready, whether they choose to attend college or not. The reality is one of those college ready indicators is standardized assessments.

We are asking that all Sabercats (present and future) engage in the standardized testing process this year and moving forward. We are asking this for several reasons.

- 1. As a feeder, we are working collaboratively to create an articulation plan for your children as they move kindergarten through twelfth grade in our feeder pattern and we believe that *all* data (including PARCC/CMAS and the College Board suite of assessments) will help us develop systems of support, intervention, challenge and enrichment.
- 2. As a feeder, we rely heavily on this data to build our master schedules, offer appropriate coursework, and meet the needs of all students, particularly as they transition from one school to the next.
- 3. Engaging in the testing process will help students prepare for future tests that have incredible power in determining our students' pathways. Whether your child will take the SAT, ACT, AP tests, or even the potential graduate competency tests, the reality is that this is a genre that students still have to perform in and we believe that their best effort on these assessments now will help them be successful on the assessments down the road that are pivotal for their college and career trajectories.

Last, but not least, we want the Sabercat feeder to continue to be a destination feeder in Douglas County. When realtors refer their clients to sites such as SchoolGrades.org and our prospective parents and students are assessing the quality of our schools by these assessments, we believe that they are misunderstanding what this feeder produces in our kids. Due to prior opt outs, that data only represents a small portion of our Sabercat students. Did you know that last year our sabercat community had two Boettcher scholars, two National Merit semi-finalists, two appointments to the US Air Force Academy and administered 604 Advanced Placement exams? The caliber of our students and our community is exceptional.

This year, we ask that all of our #Sabercatsoptin! Please encourage your child to not only take the standardized assessments, but to show the world and our community what it means to be a Sabercat! Let's show the world that we are producing the best, the brightest, the kindest, and the most innovative students in Douglas County. Kindergarten Enrollment

Kindergarten Enrollment for the 2018/19 school year has begun. If you will have a student in kindergarten next year we encourage you to enroll them today. Front Office Tid Bits

Attendance: If your child is going to be absent, their absence should be reported to the attendance line at 303-387-5902. Attendance calls and emails are sent after attendance is taken by teachers for all unverified absences. We update attendance records with late arrivals who sign in at the office.

End of Day Messages: Please call the office before 3:45 pm. End of day messages are delivered at 3:45 pm. Please try to keep your end of day messages to a minimum - they should be used for last minute changes only.

Early Leaves: We are experiencing a large number of students being signed out early in the afternoons, many within the last 15 minutes of school. We recognize that afternoon appointments are sometimes unavoidable but please keep in mind that students signing out early are a disruption to their classroom's routine and the learning environment.

Kiss N Go: Please do not park in the Kiss N Go Lane . Remember that parents are dropping off and picking up in that lane. We appreciate you parking in the parking lot to walk your child in to school.

Visitors: We welcome you to come and visit your student at lunch or volunteer in the classroom or to come look for missing items in our lost and found. If you come during school hours you will be asked to sign in on our visitor log and wear a badge so that staff throughout the building may see that you have checked in at the office. It is a simple way to help keep our kids safe.

Illness: When can your student return to school?

After 24 hours of medication for the following conditions: strep throat, conjunctivitis, infected skin eruptions and other conditions requiring antibiotics (Exception: If being treated for Pertussis, student must be on antibiotics for 5 days)

The student has been free of the following conditions for at least 24 hours:

• fever, eye drainage, vomiting

The student has been free of the following conditions for at least 48 hours:

• diarrhea, vomiting (if related to a stomach virus such as Norovirus)





Innovation Lab

February marked the beginning our our fifth rotation in the Innovation Lab. While students continued to practice the LAUNCH Cycle, a kid-friendly approach to the Design Thinking process, this unit has looked very different than other rotations. During this round in the lab, all grade levels focused on nearly an identical design challenge: How might I write a design challenge statement for my own passion project? (Grades 3-6) and How might I plan my own passion project? (Grades K-2) This round in the lab had students preparing to create and execute their own Design Challenge during the last couple months of school. They had the opportunity to explore some of the tools that they have already worked with a little deeper, while also being introduced to several new tools. One of these tools was Bloxels. Using the app and Bloxels gameboard, students are able to create their own video games including both the game environment and characters. The photo shows student working with the Bloxels.




1st grade


